Dedicated Volunteers

Every year the Department of Environment and Water recognises significant achievements of the volunteers who give their time to improve parks and reserves in South Australia. This process is facilitated by the Friends of Parks and Nature Inc. and coordinated by the Volunteer Programs Unit.

Friends of Gluepot Reserve came into being in 2004, and since 2024 we have had 11 of our volunteers recognised for 20 years of service. All recipients receive a framed certificate, a personal letter from the Minister for Climate, Environment and Water, and a hat badge.

This year, Martin and Janet Toland were acknowledged for their contribution to Gluepot Reserve over 20 years.

This is an outstanding effort, considering that Martin and Janet live in New Zealand. For most of the years since 2001, they have undertaken the jobs of Assistant Ranger and then Rangers, staying for two months at a time.

Martin is a skilled carpenter and has been involved in many of the building projects at Gluepot.

Janet is the perfect back up - coordinating their trips, welcoming the visitors to the Reserve, and keeping up with all the data collection and computer work, as well as assisting with the construction processes.

The Kitchen Renovations

An amazing amount of work has been done on this project in the last three months.

The Rangers over this period – Martin and Janet Toland, Brendan and Maryanne Freeman, Graham and Linda Lee, Mark and Georgia Darter, Sharon Moore and Scott Morgan, Bronwyn Mart and Geoff Gibbons -and their assistant Rangers, have done a wonderful job keeping the Reserve running, hosting many volunteers and visitors and always contributing to the building works.

Once the concrete slab had been poured, Ian and Margaret Falkenberg delivered a large trailer-load of roof trusses and wall construction timber. Then, a construction team led by Fred and Petra Van der Heiden, and ably assisted by Vic Breeding, Rod Bradtke, Craig Oliver, Shane Petsch, Anne & Dave Sellar, and Stephen Gun erected the treated timber stud walls.

From 14th – 18th June, the corrugated iron to the roof trusses and wall structures together with the guttering and eaves were finished, once again with the help of Fred, Vic, Rod, Anne and Dave along with Arthur Simpson also assisting. Insulation batts were then installed. A trench was dug by Steve Shaw for the electrical cable, and Adrian Jacobs has completed the electrical circuits for lighting and power points.

Gyprock has been applied to the internal walls by Con Zagotsis and his team, and the walls have been painted by Ian and Oriana Williams. Dennis Mathews, Craig Oliver, Geoff Gibbons and Bronwyn Mart assisted Ian and Margaret Falkenberg over three days working towards preparing architraves and skirting prior to the placement of kitchen fittings.

There have been several rain interruptions along the way. Much work was done by Vic Breeding and Arthur Simpson to keep the roads graded and safe. Other volunteers who have contributed along the way include Jenny Reilly, Julia Harris, Mike Chuk, Dave Georg and John Glover.

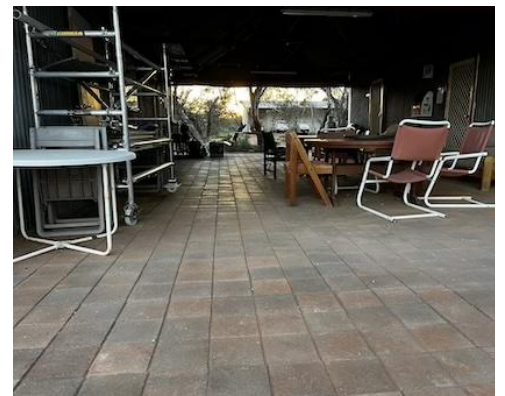

River Murray and Mallee Aboriginal Corporation (RMMAC)

In 1998, the River Murray and Mallee Aboriginal peoples submitted a claim to have their Native Title Rights and Interests recognised in Law. After 13 years, on 18th November 2011, Native Title consent determination was bestowed on the River Murray and Mallee peoples. This recognised that the River Murray and Mallee peoples had exclusive rights and interests to parts of their traditional lands in the Riverland of South Australia. The River Murray and Mallee Aboriginal Corporation now administers this land on behalf of their community.

After much work, by March 2022, the Corporation had developed a team of Rangers to lead their young men and women in caring for country. The founding principles for the Corporation are to celebrate living culture, assess and protect areas of cultural heritage, and to care for the environment. By building partnerships that support pathways for education and training, employment opportunities are expected to follow. The Corporation also advocates to improve health services, develop youth programmes and foster community pride in their culture.

The Corporation, through the Rangers, has been working with several local environmental groups, and while learning new skills, the Rangers are also contributing to the understanding regarding traditional aboriginal culture.

Gluepot is preparing to work closely with RMMAC, and we anticipate that this arrangement will be beneficial to both parties.

Weeding at Gluepot: Sometimes choices are needed

Following exceptional rains in early autumn, germination of both native and invasive seeds was immediately evident. Areas with a history of either stocking (such as old dams) or general soil disturbance (e.g., close to buildings) are particularly susceptible to weed infestations. The good news is that vast areas of Gluepot remain weed free with endemic species thriving.

Managing current weed growth has required volunteers to make choices based on a number of factors: the emergence of specific species, past efforts to eliminate species, their location, time and effort required to reduce further spread. For example, Wards Weed is targeted along all track edges to minimise spreading by vehicles, but when located at old dam sites, it is too common to be successfully eliminated.

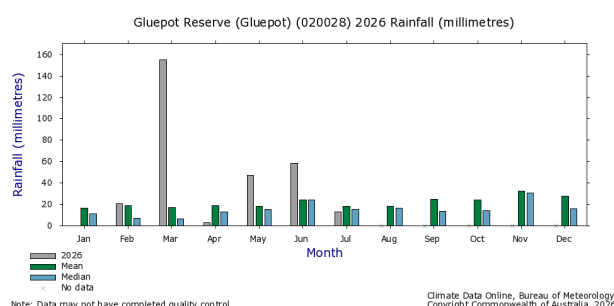

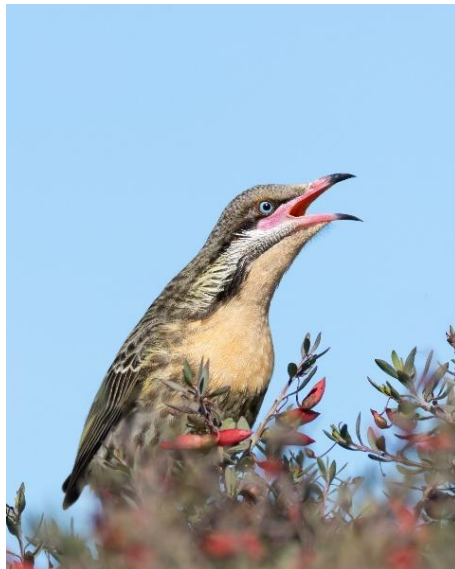

Snakes of Gluepot Reserve – the Ringed Brown Snake (*Pseudonaja modesta*)

The Ringed Brown Snake is one of the more commonly sighted snakes on Gluepot (not that snakes are seen very often). My most recent sighting was whilst undertaking fox baiting, when one slithered almost between the legs of my colleague who was down on all fours burying a fox bait. The snake showed no obvious behavioural response to our presence and appeared to be foraging amongst the plants, perhaps for a meal. This lack of interest in us was most likely due to our ability to stay calm, with minimal movement whilst observing the snake.

Fifty species of reptiles (snakes and lizards) have been observed on Gluepot Reserve. This includes 39 lizard and 11 snake species. The snakes include 2 species of blind snakes and 9 species of elapids, the latter also referred to as the front-fanged venomous snakes.

The Ringed Brown Snake is an elapid and the smallest member in the genus *Pseudonaja*. This genus comprises 9 species in Australia, including some of the most dangerously venomous snakes in the world.

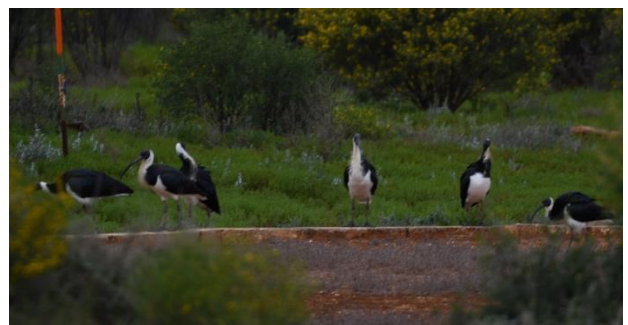
This relatively slender adult snake has a total length up to about 60 cm. Varying in dorsal (the back) colour from greyish tan to reddish brown, it has a black patch on the head and a black band across the neck. One helpful identifier is the presence of 4-11 thin dark crossbands present along the length of the body. However, in aging adults, the crossbands fade and may not be visible at all.



Observed in a variety of habitat types, the Ringed Brown Snake is primarily diurnal (active during the daytime) but may forage nocturnally (at night-time) during hot weather. Its diet comprises mainly small lizards. As well as envenoming their prey, there is some evidence that the species uses constriction to subdue its prey.

This small to medium sized snake is usually inoffensive, but as with most snakes, it may bite if harassed, trodden on or handled. Reports of bites and envenomation by the Ringed Brown Snake are rare. One bite described in 1987 reported mild symptoms without significant blood clotting (bleeding, bruising) or neurological (breathing difficulty, paralysis) symptoms. Although the venom is reported as having limited medical significance for humans, a snakebite should be regarded as potentially dangerous and appropriate first aid applied.

Aspects of Management of Gluepot Reserve

At Gluepot, the management committee aims to use the best available scientific data when making management decisions. There is always a balance to find between protecting habitat for native birds and other animals and being welcoming to the growing number of visitors. This year the Reserve has been closed on several occasions because of significant rainfall events. These decisions are necessary to prevent damage to the main road into Gluepot as well as the internal vehicle tracks. Keeping visitors safe is also front of mind.

The Science and Monitoring Committee, ably led by Rebecca Boulton and Greg Johnston, oversee all the research studies that occur at Gluepot.

Currently Gluepot is involved in 6 major projects:

1. The call of the mallee project in partnership with Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB), Department of Environment and Water (DEW), and the Australian Landscape Trust (ALT). The habitat augmentation at Sandy Dam is one part of this project, and initial Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Surveys have been carried out, and significant artifacts have been found. The RMMAC will be doing follow up surveys and will be involved in other projects on Gluepot.
2. Developing automated Acoustic Recognition for the Mallee Birds – a project led by La Trobe University.
3. A National Environmental Science Program (NESP) project which aims to restore landscape resilience, safeguarding mallee birds and their habitats from compounding threats. Organisations also involved in this project are La Trobe University, University of New England, CSIRO, MRLB.
4. An Australian Research Council (ARC) project being undertaken by RMIT University is looking into the benefits of Private Protected Areas. Gluepot Reserve is the first conservation area that they have examined.
5. Phenology citizen science project: mallee tree flowering cycles, partnering with the ALT.
6. Resolving the drivers of variation in cooperative social groups along environmental gradients. This project is being led by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Monitoring of the bird population is done regularly throughout the year. Volunteers are assigned areas of the Reserve to carry out their bird atlassing, and they try to do this about 4 times a year.

Gluepot participates in the National Malleefowl survey every year. Dates for 2026 will be advertised soon.

Reptile and small mammal surveys and bird banding are undertaken yearly. The plan is to conduct these surveys around the weekend of 10-11 of October this year. While the risks of H5-Bird-Flu spreading to birds in Mallee environments is low, it may be that for biosecurity requirements some of these surveys may need to be cancelled.
